SPEECH AND LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST Certificated Salary Schedule 07

DEFINITION

Under the supervision of the Director of Student Services, the Speech and Language Pathologist will provide diagnostic, remedial and consultative services for children with communication disorders; perform as support staff member in school to determine special needs of children who display speech, language and hearing difficulties.

MAJOR DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Screen pupils for communicative disorders and select cases according to appropriate criteria as determined by speech and language pathologist and by state and federal guidelines
- 2. Employ assessment procedures, techniques and standardized tests necessary for thorough and accurate diagnosis of communication disorders
- 3. Convey pertinent communication skills information to appropriate personnel, including referrals for medical or other professional attention
- 4. Conduct initial and triennial assessments in areas of speech/language deficits for preschool through 8th grade students
- 5. Make a recommendation of eligibility to the IEP team in the area of articulation/phonology, abnormal voice, fluency, and language, based on assessments
- 6. Provide written reports for parent and applicable personnel after assessment is completed
- 7. Establish individual education plans for students admitted to program and reviews IEPs at least annually
- 8. Implement IEPs for pupils admitted to the program; provides therapy for individuals and/or groups
- 9. Maintain accurate and complete records of services, student data progress data, and contact logs
- 10. Meet all required assessment and IEP timelines as required by state and federal guidelines
- 11. Notify parents, administrators, and appropriate personnel of IEP meetings
- 12. Provide information and assistance to parents
- 13. Attempt to maintain a caseload that does not exceed the State recommended average of 55 persons per full time equivalent speech-language pathologist
- 14. Meet and confer with teachers about methods and techniques for dealing with special problems and modifying education programs for speech/language/hearing problems
- 15. Provide in-service training for teachers and parents as needed
- 16. Carry out appropriate follow-up procedures for pupils dismissed from the speech and language program
- 17. Participate in conferences and meetings
- 18. Pursue professional growth through education workshops and coursework
- 19. Assume responsibility for implementation of state and federal regulations as related to speech and language services
- 20. Perform other related duties as assigned
